America's Darwin Tina Gianquitto, 2014-06-15 While much has been written about the impact of Darwin's theories on U S culture and countless scholarly collections have been devoted to the science of evolution few have addressed the specific details of Darwin's theories as a cultural force affecting U S writers America's Darwin fills this gap and features a range of critical approaches that examine U S textual responses to Darwin's works The scholars in this collection represent a range of disciplines literature history of science women's studies geology biology entomology and anthropology All pay close attention to the specific forms that Darwinian evolution took in the United States engaging not only with Darwin's most famous works such as *On the Origin of Species* but also with less familiar works such as *The Expression of the Emotions in Man and Animals* Each contributor considers distinctive social cultural and intellectual conditions that affected the reception and dissemination of evolutionary thought from before the publication of *On the Origin of Species* to the early years of the twenty first century These essays engage with the specific details and language of a wide selection of Darwin's texts treating his writings as primary sources essential to comprehending the impact of Darwinian language on American writers and thinkers This careful engagement with the texts of evolution enables us to see the broad points of its acceptance and adoption in the American scene this approach also highlights the ways in which writers reformers and others reconfigured Darwinian language to suit their individual purposes America's Darwin demonstrates the many ways in which writers and others fit themselves to a narrative of evolution whose dominant motifs are contingency and uncertainty Collectively the authors make the compelling case that the interpretation of evolutionary theory in the U S has always shifted in relation to prevailing cultural anxieties

**Stronger, Truer, Bolder** Karen L. Kilcup, 2021-05-15 Virtually every famous nineteenth-century writer, Harriet Beecher Stowe, Nathaniel Hawthorne, Ralph Waldo Emerson and many not so famous, wrote literature for children; many contributed regularly to children's periodicals and many entered the field of nature writing, responding to and forwarding the century's huge social and cultural changes. Appreciating America's unique natural wonders dovetailed with children's growth as citizens, but children's journals often exceeded a pedagogical purpose, intending also to entertain and delight. Though these volumes aimed at a relatively conservative and mostly white middle-class and affluent audience, some selections allowed both children and their parents room for imaginative escape from restrictive social norms. Covering a period that initially regarded

children's natural bodies as laboring resources Stronger Truer Bolder traces the shifting pedagogical impulse surrounding nature and the environment through the transformations that included America's nineteenth century emergence as an industrial power Karen L Kilcup shows how children's literature mirrored those changes in various ways In its earliest incarnations it taught children and their parents facts about the natural world and about proper behavior vis vis both human and nonhuman others More significantly as periodical writing for children advanced this literature increasingly promoted children's environmental agency and envisioned their potential influence on concerns ranging from animal rights and interspecies equity to conservation and environmental justice Such understanding of and engagement with nature not only propelled children toward ethical adulthood but also formed a foundation for responsible American citizenship

**Darwinian Feminism and Early Science Fiction** Patrick B Sharp, 2018-03-28 Darwinian Feminism in Early Science Fiction provides the first detailed scholarly examination of women's SF in the early magazine period before the Second World War Tracing the tradition of women's SF back to the 1600s the author demonstrates how women such as Margaret Cavendish and Mary Shelley drew critical attention to the colonial mindset of scientific masculinity which was attached to scientific institutions that excluded women In the late nineteenth century Charles Darwin's theory of sexual selection provided an impetus for a number of first wave feminists to imagine Amazonian worlds where women control their own bodies relationships and destinies Patrick B Sharp traces how these feminist visions of scientific femininity Amazonian power and evolutionary progress proved influential on many women publishing in the SF magazines of the late 1920s and early 1930s and presents a compelling picture of the emergence to prominence of feminist SF in the early twentieth century before vanishing until the 1960s

Haunting Realities Monika Elbert, Wendy Ryden, 2017-06-20 An innovative collection of essays examining the sometimes paradoxical alignment of Realism and Naturalism with the Gothic in American literature to highlight their shared qualities Following the golden age of British Gothic in the late eighteenth century the American Gothic's pinnacle is often recognized as having taken place during the decades of American Romanticism However Haunting Realities explores the period of American Realism the end of the nineteenth century to discover evidence of fertile ground for another age of Gothic proliferation At first glance Naturalist Gothic seems to be a contradiction in terms While the Gothic is known for its sensational effects with its emphasis on horror and the supernatural the doctrines of late nineteenth century Naturalism attempted to move away from the aesthetics of sentimentality and stressed sobering mechanistic views of reality steeped in scientific thought and the determinism of market values and biology Nonetheless what binds Gothicism and Naturalism together is a vision of shared pessimism and the perception of a fearful lingering presence that ominously haunts an impending modernity Indeed it seems that in many Naturalist works reality is so horrific that it can only be depicted through Gothic tropes that prefigure the alienation and despair of modernism In recent years research on the Gothic has flourished yet there has been no extensive study of the links between the Gothic and Naturalism particularly those which

to a much lesser degree the geographical spaces of the nation the less iconic creatures of civilization the various species of domesticated working and companion animals have arguably played an even more critical role in the genesis of modern American culture and society throughout the long nineteenth century Until recently however despite their ubiquity in historical documents social relations and cultural productions animals have rarely been of serious interest to mainstream historians American Beasts argues that an adequate understanding of American history and indeed of human history more broadly requires a sustained engagement with its multifaceted more than human dimensions The contributions collected here offer various insights into the broad relevance of animality and human animal relations from the culture of pet keeping and the role of animals and animality in the context of slavery and abolition to the emergence of animal athletes at the turn of the twentieth century as aspects that have always influenced all areas of American society In addition by highlighting the ways in which human animal relations crucially shaped the relations of power between different groups of humans American Beasts shows that a stronger concern with animals and animality also allows us to address the complex intersections between the history of human animal relations and the histories of for example race class and gender in the United States in the time from the early national period to the Progressive Era
