reading of a personal or place name The purpose of this volume is to enable Sinologists and others involved in Chinese studies to access entries in Japanese reference works dealing with China without going through the time consuming process of looking up characters by radical and stroke For users of this dictionary it is a simple matter to find a character by looking it up by its alphabetical pinyin pronunciation Having located it the user can go directly to the item in Japanese reference works The Dictionary includes more than 13 072 entries not only in Chinese characters and their Sino Japanese ondoku onyomi readings but also the Japanese kundoku kunyomi readings The romanized Japanese readings will assist in correctly transcribing Japanese names such as the names of Japanese publishers and authors and the technical terms employed by Japanese in their writings on China These features will also give those familiar with pinyin greater access to material on Japanese history and culture The ABC Dictionary of Sino Japanese Readings will be a boon to Sinologists and others interested in the study of China Minimal Old Chinese and Later Han Chinese Axel Schuessler, 2023-12-31 Although long out of date Bernard Karlgren s 1957 remains the most convenient work for looking up Middle Chinese ca A D 600 and Old Chinese before 200 B C reconstructions of all graphs that occur in literature from the beginning of writing ca 1250 B C down to the third century B C In the present volume Axel Schuessler provides a more current reconstruction of Old Chinese limiting it as far as possible to those post Karlgrenian phonological features of Old Chinese that enjoy some consensus among today s investigators At the same time the updating of the material disregards more speculative theories and proposals Schuessler refers to these minimal forms as Minimal Old Chinese OCM He bases OCM on Baxter s 1992 reconstructions but with some changes mostly notational In keeping with its minimal aspect the OCM forms are kept as simple as possible and transcribed in an equally simple notation Some issues in Old Chinese phonology still await clarification hence interpolations and proposals of limited currency appear in this update Karlgren's Middle Chinese reconstructions as emended by Li Fang kuei are widely cited as points of reference for historical forms of Chinese as well as dialects This emended Middle Chinese is also supplied by Schuessler Another important addition to Karlgren's work is an intermediate layer midway between the Old and Middle Chinese periods known as Later Han Chinese ca second century A D The additional layer makes this volume a useful resource for those working on Han sources especially poetry This book is intended as a companion to the original Grammata Serica Recensa and therefore does not repeat other information provided there Matters such as English glosses and references to the earliest occurrence of a graph can be looked up in Grammata Serica Recensa itself or in other relevant dictionaries The great accomplishment of this companion volume is to update an essential reference and thereby fulfill the need for an accessible and user friendly source for citing the various historically reconstructed stages of Chinese **Handbook of 'Phags-Pa Chinese** W. processes in language change from different theoretical perspectives Key notions discussed throughout the book include affirmative and negative existential constructions the expansion of the latter into verbal negation and subsequently from more specific to more general markers of negation Nominalizations as well as the uses of negative existentials as standalone negative answers figure among the most frequent pathways whereby negative existentials evolve as general negation markers. The operation of the Negative Existential Cycle appears partly genealogically conditioned as the cycle is found to iterate regularly within some families but never starts in others as is the case in Bantu In addition other special negation markers such as nominal negators are found to undergo similar processes i e they expand into the verbal domain and thereby develop into more general negation markers. The book provides rich information on a specific path of the evolution of negation on cyclical processes in language change and it show cases the historical comparative method in a modern setting
