Thirty-five years ago E.V. Gatenby, a well-known British authority on ELT of his day, wrote the following: "The strange thing is that though problems connected with language learning were all known and solved more than a hundred years ago the solutions have never been given widespread acceptance or application." (Gatenby 1950) Obviously wrong in believing that language-teaching problems could have been solved for all times to come, Gatenby was right in exaggerating a truth that many ELT thinkers have referred to since his day – that language teaching suffers for want of awareness of what has been established in earlier generations. And if language teaching is a field that unfortunately lacks dependable record of past events and achievements, English language teaching is no exception. The record of events in it has been both scanty and subjective. In few academic fields can it be said with greater certainty that the neglect of predecessors' work is a major roadblock to progress; ELT thought and, much more so, ELT practice suffer from extraordinary discontinuity and, in some measure, extraordinary distortion.

Anthony Howatt therefore deserves our gratitude for the years of productive effort he has put into giving ELT its first history based on original works, including a number of rare volumes that are available only in a few libraries of the English-speaking world. Comprehensive in its coverage of the outstanding events of several centuries in this field, carefully researched and thoughtfully documented, this first full-length history has something else to recommend it: its highly readable style.

Divided into four parts, the actual history runs to about 300 pages. The rest of the book, some one hundred pages, provides an addendum of particular relevance to scholars: a brief epilogue "on rational and natural approaches to language teaching", "a chronology of English language teaching", "biographical notes" on outstanding contributors to several centuries of ELT scholarship with special attention to "individuals whose contribution to the subject may not have been sufficiently acknowledged in the main text", an appendix which provides the first English translation of Vietor's revolutionary
