Pearce,2017-03-06 Beginning in 1172 Judah ibn Tibbon who was called the father of Hebrew translators wrote a letter to his son that was full of personal and professional guidance The detailed

letter described as an ethical will was revised through the years and offered a vivid picture of intellectual life among Andalusí elites exiled in the south of France after 1148 S J Pearce sets this letter into broader context and reads it as a document of literary practice and intellectual values She reveals how ibn Tibbon as a translator of philosophical and religious texts explains how his son should make his way in the family business and how to operate textually within Arabic literary models even when writing for a non Arabic audience While the letter is also full of personal criticism and admonitions Pearce shows ibn Tibbon making a powerful argument in favor of the continuation of Arabic as a prestige language for Andalusí Jewish readers and writers even in exile outside of the Islamic world

*Signs of Virginity* Micha'el Rosenberg, 2018 *Signs of Virginity* examines virginity testing in Judaism and early Christianity and the relationship of these tests to male sexual violence Rosenberg points to two authors Augustine of Hippo and the rabbinic collective that produced the Babylonian Talmud who construct alternative models that if taken seriously would utterly reverse cultural ideals of masculinity encouraging men to be gentle rather than brutal in their sexual behavior
