Heath, 2019-08-29 *Post Christendom Studies* publishes research on the nature of Christian identity and mission in the contexts of post Christendom Post Christendom refers to places both now and in the past where Christianity was once a significant cultural presence though not necessarily the dominant religion Sometimes Christendom refers to the official link between church and state The term post Christendom is often associated with the rise of secularization religious pluralism and multiculturalism in western countries over the past sixty years Our use of the term is broader than that however Egypt for example can be considered a post Christendom context It was once a leading center of Christianity Christendom moreover does not necessarily mean official public and dominant religion For example under Saddam Hussein Christianity was probably a minority religion but for the most part Christians were left alone After America deposed Saddam Christians began to flee because they became a persecuted minority In that sense post Saddam Iraq is an experience of post Christendom it is a shift from a cultural context in which Christians have more or less freedom to exercise their faith to one where they are persecuted and or marginalized for doing so

The Facts on the Ground William Dyrness, 2021-12-16

Starting with the fraught and often contested role of Christian participation in contemporary culture and in the light of the chaotic challenges of recent events William Dyrness develops a biblical theology of cultural wisdom both its poetics and its practice as a way of making sense both of these human cultural challenges and of God's presence on the way to the New

Creation Making use of the biblical category of wisdom in both Old and New Testaments Dyrness offers a fresh way to understand both human responsibility in culture and God's presence and purposes for creation as this developed in the life of Israel and was embodied in the life and teachings of Christ Centrally the book argues Christ's life and teaching represent a Christian wisdom that opened up new possibilities for human culture This Christian wisdom emerged as the Gospel made its way in culture first into the Greco Roman world of the Early Church and then since the Reformation into the modern period Dyrness suggests this Christ centered cultural wisdom offers resources that help illumine and transform received notions of common grace and even general and special revelation

Evangelical Peacemakers David P. Gushee, 2013-10-09 This book contains fifteen essays originally presented at a conference on evangelical Christianity and global peacemaking held at Georgetown University in September 2012 together with a critical analysis of the collection by the editor David P Gushee The essays fall into two categories the first four essays primarily engage theoretical issues in the ethics of war and peace considering pacifism just war and just peacemaking approaches all in contemporary US context The other eleven essays offer glimpses into current evangelical peacemaking efforts being undertaken by individuals congregations parachurch organizations and global evangelical bodies The collection as a whole gives considerable attention to Christian Muslim relations and offers a number of extraordinary accounts of evangelical peacemaking with Muslims and efforts to engage Islam as a living religious tradition The concluding essay suggests that while evangelical peace and war thinking cannot escape the paradoxes and challenges that have always bedeviled Christian theorizing about war contemporary evangelical peacemaking efforts reflect substantial progress in implementing the radical love of Jesus Christ in some of the most challenging contexts and conflicts in our world today

Commonwealth and Covenant Marcia Pally, 2016 In *Commonwealth and Covenant* Marcia Pally argues that in order to address current socioeconomic problems we need not more economic formulas but rather a better understanding of how the world is set up an ontology of how we and the world work Without this good proposals that arise lack political will and go unimplemented Pally describes our basic setup as separability amid situatedness or distinction amid relation Though we are all unique individuals we become our singular selves through our relations and responsibilities to the people and environments around us Pally argues that our culture's overemphasis on separability individualism run amok results in greed adversarial and deceitful political discourse and chicanery resource grabbing broken relationships and anomie Maintaining that separability and situatedness can and must be considered together in public policy Pally draws on intellectual history philosophy and especially historic Christian and Jewish theologies of relationality to construct a new framework for addressing present economic and political ills

Defending Democracy from Its Christian Enemies David P.
