A Long Way Home Terence Dillon, 2013-12 A Long Way Home is a dramatic and tension filled fictional story that explores the relationship between the English and the Irish in the late nineteenth century It provides a fascinating insight into the issues created when those looking for conciliation come into conflict with those relying on confrontation in the struggle for Irish independence The book traces the experiences of Paul Doherty an Irishman immigrant In a story that raises important issues of race class religion sex violence and secret societies Doherty struggles to look for conciliation rather than confrontation bringing him into conflict with his great friend and fellow Irishman Will who is a member of the Irish Republican Brotherhood The theme of confrontation and conciliation continues through the relationships Doherty has with the English arch racist Maurice Whitehouse and the English philanthropist William Harding The book also draws upon comparisons between life in rural Ireland and the dark streets of an English industrial town of the late nineteenth century as it builds to a powerful conclusion of romance and violence

The Removal of Irish Paupers from Britain Lewis Darwen, Donald MacRaild, 2024-11-29 During the nineteenth century local officials sought to deal with their Irish pauper problem by removing these poor migrants back to Ireland under the laws of settlement and removal Over the course of the century hundreds of thousands of Irish paupers were forcibly repatriated in this way Even though the settlement rights of Irish immigrants gradually improved over time removals were still taking place into the twentieth century The system was widely recognised as being cruel and unfair especially in Ireland where the removal of Irish paupers from Britain garnered considerable political and press attention Much was made of the illegality of some removals and of harsh removals involving widowed women children and the elderly This book which is the first sustained study of repatriation from Britain demonstrates a persistent theme the marginal nature of Irish life on the larger island Drawing on extensive research from newspaper sources and parliamentary papers it presents an original and richly detailed perspective on Irish immigration poverty and pauperism in nineteenth century Britain

production in Europe during a period of intense globalization Their insightful introduction formulates the theme of unsettled borders and renegotiated identities that will resonate in the nine essays that follow With a focus on the critical concept of these unsettled borders the various authors explore the ways that the traditional mark of national space has been transformed through political and economic realignments as well as new technologies and the emergence of a new generation of filmmakers for whom national cinema no longer means what it did even twenty years ago The volume provides a good balance of critical approaches that includes auteur studies descriptions of state policies and the particular practices of filmmakers and producers in different parts of the continent Spain Germany Ireland the Balkans and finally useful appendices that provide a close up view of the complex nature of international co productions Marvin D Lugo Professor of Spanish Clark University This is an interesting collection of essays that has been well conceived and organised The standard of writing is high and I recommend publication I particularly commend the conceptual framework underpinning the volume This marries a cultural studies approach which still dominates the study of film in Area Studies and language departments across Europe and the US where filmic texts are increasingly used as teaching tools with the more industry based focus one tends to find adopted by Media and Screen Studies departments Thus this collection will appeal to a wide range of students and academics The introduction sets out the volume s overarching framework cogently and clearly giving a nuanced exploration of the way that the notion of the border can be used as a dynamic prism to help define and explore the limits of our understanding of Europe European identity and European culture within which cinema has long played a key role The editors give a good account for example of the way film has been employed as a space to explore the possibilities of European integration by EU politicians as well as highlighting the flaws inherent within this project They do however perhaps suggest a certain Western European North American centric view in their suggestion that the cinema of Yugoslavia Greece or Ireland is somehow less well known than other national and transnational cinemas explored here Less well known to whom However from the broad range of cinemas explored in the rest of the volume clearly this is not the case Particular high points for me are the chapters on the work of Fatih Akin by Janis Little Solomon and John Davidson s discussion of Schulze gets the Blues as well as Olivier Asselin s fascinating account of Database Cinema This will be a good addition to scholarship on European film and I look forward to receiving my copy Professor Paul Cooke University of Leeds

The Irish in the Spanish Armies in the Seventeenth Century Eduardo de Mesa, 2014 Provides a wealth of detail on how the wild geese the Irish who refused to submit to the English played a significant role in the armies of Spain It is well known that many Irishmen who refused to submit to the English in the reigns of Elizabeth and the early Stuart kings including the famous earls of Tyrone and Tyrconnell went to fight for the king of Spain but what they did when they joined the Spanish armies is much less well known This book provides a wealth of detail on the activities of the Irish in the Spanish armies in the late sixteenth and seventeenth centuries It outlines who the Irish soldiers were how they were recruited and the terms under which they served It discusses

their military roles both in the wars in Flanders between the Spanish and their former Dutch subjects and later in the Hispanic peninsula showing how the Irish were often employed as elite troops who made significant contributions to major military actions such as the siege of Breda in 1624 It examines military tactics explores the politics of the Spanish armies showing how the Irish fitted in and discusses how when the rebellion of 1641 broke out in Ireland many Irish soldiers returned to Ireland to resume the fight against the English Eduardo de Mesa completed his doctorate at University College Dublin He is the author of *La pacificación de Flandes Sp nola y las campañas de Frisia 1604 1609 2009* and *Discurso Militar del Marqués de Aytona 2008* co author of *La Monarquía de Felipe III 2008* and author of numerous articles chapters in edited collections and encyclopedia entries
