characterized by a fundamental sense of conflictedness related to the tensions between trauma or mourning and political imperatives. The work offers in-depth analyses of texts that have historicized 9/11 and shaped the way we understand this key moment in American and world history.

Mapping Generations of Traumatic Memory in American Narratives Dana Mihăilescu, Roxana Oltean, Mihaela Precup, 2014-06-12. This volume collects work by several European, North American, and Australian academics who are interested in examining the performance and transmission of post-traumatic memory in the contemporary United States. The contributors depart from the interpretation of trauma as a unique exceptional event that shatters all systems of representation as seen in the writing of early trauma theorists like Cathy Caruth, Shoshana Felman, and Dominick LaCapra. Rather, the chapters in this collection are in conversation with more recent readings of trauma such as Michael Rothberg's *Multidirectional Memory* (2009), the role of mediation and remediation in the dynamics of cultural memory (Astrid Erll, 2012), Aleida Assmann (2011), and Stef Craps' focus on postcolonial witnessing and its cross-cultural dimension (2013). The corpus of post-traumatic narratives under discussion includes fiction, diaries, memoirs, films, visual narratives, and oral testimonies. A complicated dialogue between various and sometimes conflicting narratives is thus generated and examined along four main lines in this volume: trauma in the context of multidirectional memory; the representation of trauma in autobiographical texts; the dynamic of public forms of national commemoration; and the problematic instantiation of 9/11 as a traumatic landmark.

Twenty-First Century Fictions of Terrorism Arin Keeble, 2024-05-31. Examining novels by celebrated authors, some neglected and some brand new texts, Arin Keeble offers a detailed analysis of the ways novels from around the world have represented terrorism in the early twenty-first century. Over five chapters, he uncovers a movement away from event-based narratives toward depictions of terrorism as a violent symptom or feature of twenty-first-century world systems and neoliberalism. Beginning with the early literary response to 9/11 and the 9/11 novel genre, the book moves through more recent depictions of the endless war on terror, state terror, white nationalist terror, and historical narratives of terror that resonate in the current political climate. In doing so, it examines the changing ways literature has sought to make sense of both the reasons why terrorism occurs and the effects it has on victims, survivors, and international and intercultural relations.

Gendering Terrorism in South Asian Narratives of the Post-9/11 Era Mala Renganathan, 2025-02-21. This book contextualizes the terror histories of a wide range of representative post-9/11 terror literatures in English from the USA, India, Pakistan, Afghanistan, and Sri Lanka. It reads the selected short stories, novels, poems, and prose pieces from a gendered perspective. It particularly targets students and scholars of terrorism studies and gender studies.

Reflecting 9/11 Heather Pope, Victoria Bryan, 2016-06-22. In over fifteen years, the cultural and artistic response to 9/11 has been wide-ranging in form and function. As the turbulent post-9/11 years have unfolded, years that have been shaped and characterized by the War on Terror, the Patriot Act, the Wars in Afghanistan and Iraq, 7/7, Abu Ghraib, and Guantanamo Bay, these texts have been commemorative and heroic, have attempted to work through collective and individual traumas, and have struggled with trying

to represent the terrorist other Many of these earlier domestic heroic and traumatic works have so often been read as limitations in narrative This collection however challenges the language of limitation and provides re readings of earlier work but also traces the emergence of a new paradigm for discussing the artistic responses to 9 11 one that frames these narratives as dialogic self conscious and self reflexive interventions in the responses to the attacks the initial representations of the attacks and the ever shifting social and geopolitical continuities of the 9 11 decade These texts widen the conversation about the lasting impacts of 9 11 and incorporate strands of discussion on American exceptionalism and imperialism torture and otherness whilst still remaining invested in the personal and collective traumas of the attacks The authors included here ask crucial questions about the way 9 11 is being historicized will it for example be read as a moment of rupture or epoch Will it inevitably be attached to the War on Terror or the Wars in Iraq and Afghanistan As they trace the emergent patterns of reflexivity politicization and dissent the contributions here are also implicitly invested in asking how far they extend

Transnational American Spaces Tina Powell, Patricia Sagasti Suppes, 2022-06-07 As people migrate they face the need to create a stable space within a disconcertingly unfamiliar environment This experience of creating new spaces opens opportunities for positive transcultural connections however these opportunities can also serve as the disciplining of the migrant body This text focuses on the movement of bodies in transnational communities and the formation of domestic and communal spaces that provide respite from migratory paths negotiate transnational relationships or establish a new home In doing so we explore literary texts that question challenge and deepen our understanding of the experience of migration through the use of space and place The texts in question examine three levels of transnational spaces intimate spaces such as family personal growth or sexuality inherited spaces reflected in generational conflicts religious identity and inherited histories and national spaces that look at issues of broader national identities The texts we examine engage with transnational communities within the United States and the ways in which narratives reimagine new space to negotiate change and create new norms These narratives can sometimes bridge both cultures or can sometimes result in a violent sense of displacement Each chapter problematizes a different aspect of transcultural adaptation and the geographic ties of each community focus reflect the multicultural reality of the U S with connections to Asia the Caribbean Europe the Middle East and Latin America
