Halmos, 2012-12-06 From the Preface This book was written for the active reader The first part consists of problems frequently preceded by definitions and motivation and sometimes followed by corollaries and historical remarks The second part a very short one consists of hints The third part the longest consists of solutions proofs answers or contructions depending on the nature of the problem This is not an introduction to Hilbert space theory Some knowledge of that subject is a prerequisite at the very least a study of the elements of Hilbert space theory should proceed concurrently with the reading of this book **Inverse Linear Problems on Hilbert Space and their Krylov Solvability** Noè Angelo Caruso, Alessandro Michelangeli, 2022-02-10 This book presents a thorough discussion of the theory of abstract inverse linear problems on Hilbert space Given an unknown vector f in a Hilbert space H a linear operator A acting on H and a vector g in H satisfying Af g one is interested in approximating f by finite linear combinations of g Ag A2g A3g The closed subspace generated by the latter vectors is called the Krylov subspace of H generated by g and A The possibility of solving this inverse problem by means of projection methods on the Krylov subspace is the main focus of this text After giving a broad introduction to the subject examples and counterexamples of Krylov solvable and non solvable inverse problems are provided together with results on uniqueness of solutions classes of operators inducing Krylov solvable inverse problems and the behaviour of Krylov subspaces under small perturbations An appendix collects material on weaker convergence phenomena in general projection methods This subject of this book lies at the boundary of functional analysis operator theory and numerical analysis approximation theory and will be of interest to graduate students and researchers in any of these fields The Theory of H(b) Spaces Emmanuel Fricain, Javad Mashreghi, 2016-05-26 This is volume 1 of a 2 volume set
