5.2 Reagan and Conservatism (p. 694 - 704)

- Who was Ronald Reagan before running for President? Reagan was a well-known movie and television actor. He became governor of California as a conservative and won the republican presidential nomination in 1980. He was known for his like-able personality.
- What issues did Reagan campaign in in 1980? He attacked the democrats for expanding government and for undermining US prestige abroad.
- What was the significance of his 1980 victory? Regar won 51 percent of the popular vote and 51
 percent of the electoral vote. He completely defeated the democrats who were targeted by the
 Moral Majority. This gave republicans control of the senate for the first time since 1954.
- 4. Deline the 'Reagan Revolution'. The Reagan revolution became an idea through the reagan administration advocating supply-side economics, arguing that tax cuts and reduced government spending would increase investment by the private sector, which would lead to increased production, jobs, and prosperity.
- Explain Reaganomics' impact on taxes. Reaganomics' led to a 25% decrease in personal taxes, cuts in lots of areas of taxes like corporate income, and it was mainly beneficial to the upper-class, as the top tax rate was 28%.
- Explain Reaganomics' impact on spending, it cut massively from domestic programs like student loans and transportation, but dramatically increased military spending.
- 7. Explain Reaganomics' impact on deregulation. Business interests launched successful campaigns to influence federal and state governments to curtail regulations, lower taxes, and weaken labor unions. Business created "think tanks" such as the Heritage Foundation to promote free market ideals.
- Explain Reaganomics' impact on labor unions.
 - Reagan took a stance against unregulated unions. He believed that employers deserved the right to define their own business practices. He spread the ideas that the rights of individual workers are important, and a company must be respected. He was instrumental in changing the balance of power between workers and employers. One major act of Reagan was when he fired all workers who participated in the Professional Air Traffic Controllers Organization protests.
- 9. Explain Reaganomics' impact on the 1981 recession and subsequent recovery. Reaganomics argued that tax cuts and reduced government spending would help increase productivity in the private sector of business. The 1981 recession happened when banks failed, and unemployment reached 11%, however the impact of Reaganomics rebounded in 1983 and an extended period of recovery began. Following the recession, Reaganomics reduced restrictions on free-market economy and increased the wealth of higher income Americans.
- 10. What core social issues were part of Reagan's presidency.

During his presidency he delt through gender equality issues, abortion legislation, a much harsher stance against labor unions, oil drilling policies, foreign wage competition, trade delicits, and much of the post-war whole country aid.
